A young woman, a single mom who is a special needs teacher, is raising three children on her own. She has a 15 year old daughter, Alyssa, that was originally diagnosed with Lupus when she was in elementary school. Alyssa's has faced numerous health issues since that diagnosis and her condition was slowly deteriorating through the years. Recently after being hospitalized due to a no response situation, a doctor diagnosed her with a rare auto-immune system disease named Behcets. The disease is four possible conditions within one: multiple sclerosis, Chrohn's, celiac & lupus. There is no cure for this disease. The only treatment is to find medicines to control the symptoms and a strict diet in order for her to lead a better quality of life.



Alyssa's mom has limited income & people to help her to provide for family.

She is an upbeat person, always smiling and a caring person in spite of her personal life situation.

My act of kindness was to provide her with gas money when they travel to Mayo clinic to meet with a specialist, or to provide a meal as an unexpected treat to her family or possibly a Starbucks morning treat to get her through her day. 
"Helping Hands"

At the library, she works to pull together book requests and set up for parents to pick up their student's books and resources. Thursdays are a busy day with over a hundred book pickups each week! This year has been such a difficult year for everyone, and especially on schools, staff, faculty, and kids, and it has certainly taken its toll.

When I mentioned to her about the SPARK program, she said, "I may have need of that card!" She told me that there is a family with kids at both the elementary schools and middle school in dire need of assistance this year. She had heard that both parents lost their jobs due to COVID-19 and that we really hurting. Frankly, it looked as though they would not have any money for presents for their kids. They have three kids who all love Christmas. The thought of not having money for gifts was

heartbreaking for Kathie. She made the necessary contacts with the school staff and made

S.P.A.R.K. Society Alumni On-going Donation





Being able to be a part of the SPARK program has allowed me to help a cause I am passionate about. I am part of a group of six that has come together to help lost dogs. We met while searching for dogs and to date have found 21 lost dogs. Six of them fosters with a rescue, four that were recently adopted rescues, five that had been from a rescue, five that were "rehomed" and one we believed was dumped at a truck stop. Our goal is to save the dogs, no matter what it takes. That has included adventures like nightly stakeouts in cemeteries, trapping at a county dump, and having to release the local wildlife from a trap to

One of the invaluable tools we use is cellular trail cams. These allow us to monitor a dog without being there and scaring them away. Some of the dogs we have caught have been up to an hour away from us. In those cases we rely on local help to put out food daily for the dog while we monitor with the cameras. Without local help or cameras, our capacity to help would be limited. When it is time to set the trap, we can be nearby

and out of sight, ready to respond as soon as the door closes. The SPARK card gave us the funds needed to buy another cellular trail cam.

One of the dogs we trapped was a stray we named Millie. We became involved in the search on June 8, 2019 when a sighting of her was reported to Lost Dogs of Wisconsin. We went to the area that day and saw her watch us put out food for her. But she never returned to that spot. Sightings were few and far between. Some sightings reported days after she was spotted. We had a confirmed sighting on August 5th that was 2.3 miles from the first sighting. Bait and cameras were placed on the 7th, a trap a day later. She came regularly every night between 8:30 and 9:00 and spent most of the night hanging around the trap. On Sunday night the 11th, we made the trip to set the trap. She was trapped a couple of hours later. We took her to a garage to release her from the trap and scan her for a chip. She had one but when the owner was called, he told us she had run away right after he got her, the first week of April, and he didn't want her back. He had never looked for her or reported her missing. From the chip we learned, she was three years old and originally came from TX about 2-1/2 years before. She tested positive for Lyme's disease and has an old fracture on her back. We surrendered her to a humane society where she spent a few months recuperating before being adopted.

Watching dogs be reunited with their owners or be adopted by a family where they are loved is very rewarding and makes everything we do to capture them worthwhile.

"Shinning A Light On Hope"

We decided to donate to Porchlight in Madison, WI. Porchlight is a non-profit agency that strives to reduce homelessness in Dane County by collaborating with the community and empowering the individuals and families they serve.

Porchlight's story began in November 1984, when multiple people experiencing homelessness froze to death on the streets of Madison. They provide emergency shelter, outreach services, eviction prevention, employment services, recovery support, and affordable transitional and permanent housing to over 8,000 people annually.

They offer an employment-training program called Porchlight Products, which works with disabled and formerly homeless individuals who have struggled to return to or remain in a mainstream employment setting. Trainees learn basic job skills such as proper hygiene and time management, as well as the skills to take raw ingredients and turn them into quality food products. These products (e.g. apple sauce, sauerkraut, multi-grain pancake mix, etc.) are then available at local stores and on the menus of area restaurants.



After COVID cases have dwindled, I hope to volunteer for Porchlight in some capacity. Until then, I thought they would really appreciate the financial support. Thank you to MFG for creating the S.P.A.R.K. Society!

They are lead by a trio of very dedicated women from Middleton and Stoughton. They are passionate about providing personalized adoptions and enriching the lives of people and animals by finding the right forever homes for homeless, unwanted, and abused cats and kittens. They have been known to camp out all night to capture abandoned ferals and kittens. Once captured, these cats are provided veterinary care. The ones who are social are taken off the streets furever (pun intended).

During this stay at home/COVID19 period, they are still adopting out cats and kittens. You can fill out an application and arrange to meet the cats in a safe way with distancing between people. During the pandemic, folks isolated from families and loved ones are finding a fuzzy companion can provide love and cuddles badly needed for. They are also looking for fosters. Since 2016, 9 Lives has adopted more than 600 cats and kittens to such wonderful people and families and hope to continue to do so with support and volunteers! While this isn't a large number in itself, 9 Lives Rescue doing its small part in helping more cats and kittens to find wonderful homes instead of adding more to the overpopulation and homelessness.
